Job description:

Acting as the ship's Officer in charge of Watch and Ship Security Officer (SSO).

Main tasks:

- Represents the Master on the bridge when acting as the Officer in charge of Watch, being responsible for
 - safe navigation of the ship according to good seamanship and skills, paying particular attention to avoiding collision and grounding.
 - the use of electronic navigation equipment and having profound knowledge of the properties and limitations of this equipment.
 - the ship's radio communications during his watch
 - the correctness of logbook entries made during his watch.
- Is responsible for the navigation and handling of the ship according to good seamanship and skills.
- Draws up and plans the route plans.
- Is responsible for the publications related to the ship's navigation and for updating the nautical charts (paper and electronic).
- Is responsible for the tasks of the Ship Security Officer (SSO) in accordance with the ship's security plan and the ISPS regulations.
- Is responsible for providing information about the ship's safety system to the ship's crew and visitors and for the induction measures for the deck department.
- Plans and presents the advance and scheduled servicing and the spare part, maintenance measures for the navigating equipment.
- Participation in mooring/unmooring and anchoring operations.
- Tasks in accordance with the muster list
- Other tasks assigned by the superior

Cooperation and communication:

- Other departments of the ship
- Other ships / icebreakers in the projects
- Charterers representatives / customers
- Merchant vessels and pilot stations
- Port authority
- CSO

Minimum qualifications:

- Experience and knowledge on an icebreaker and Offshore industry, with at least 1 year experience as a Second Officer.
- Minimum 1 year of Baltic Sea icebreaking experience.
- Expert level ship handling skills of the vessel type and thrusters.
- Requirements for personal qualities include good human skills for working as a member of the crew in co-operation with others with minimal conflicts between other people on board.
- Ability to work at sea tolerating isolation, working well with other members of the crew, and tolerating vessel movements without getting seasick easily.
- Before assigning a steady position the details and qualities of a person need to be assessed with the superiors and the office for approval.
